

4 Steps for Building a Safe Siting Program



The problem: The location of an early care and education (ECE) program is sometimes not given enough consideration. Children may be at risk from contamination — left behind from how the building or property was used in the past, from naturally occurring harmful substances, or from nearby sites.



The solution: State health departments, licensing agencies, local planning and zoning departments, and others can collaborate to address gaps in regulations and policies — so ECE programs aren't at risk from harmful chemicals.

Follow these 4 steps to start a safe siting program in your state.



Form partnerships

✔ Reach out to other state, county, or local agencies to collaborate

Identify ways to strengthen licensing policies

- ✔ Review current rules, policies, and practices for locating ECE programs in your area
- ✓ Look for environmental health risks that might have been missed

Build on existing resources

- Don't start from scratch when developing your program look for ways to create a safe siting program without additional funding or staff
- ✓ Use current programs as models

Implement the program

- ✔ Educate staff and other agencies about the value of safe siting and how the program works
- ✓ Find ECE programs and locations with potential issues and if you find problems, follow up Track your successes — and refine your program based on
